Warren Family Thanks Nurse for Comfort and Support

It is a mild autumn afternoon, and Barbara “Bobbie” Wasley, her daughter, Jane, and Tara Shortsleeve, RN, are standing in the Wasleys’ kitchen discussing the details of a hospital bed delivery for Bobbie’s husband, Irving “Wings” Wasley. Mr. Wasley is resting on the sofa in the living room, where sunlight illuminates the family portraits and photographs that decorate their home. The two women have many questions for Tara, the VNA Northwest nurse who has become a trusted friend to them over the past several weeks. When one of them apologizes for asking so many questions, Tara reassures them. “That’s what I’m here for!” “I can’t speak highly enough about Tara,” said Mrs. Wasley. “She’s been wonderful.”

Under VNA Northwest’s hospice plan of care, the symptoms of Mr. Wasley’s terminal illness were quickly brought under control so that he could spend his final days in the comfort of his home, surrounded by his family. Known to many in the Warren area as a loving husband, father and grandfather, he passed away at his home on November 4, at the age of 83. His obituary reads, “he loved his family and was happiest when he was with them.” Mr. and Mrs. Wasley celebrated 55 years of marriage in October of this year.

The cost of hospice care is often covered by Medicare and private insurance programs. To the extent funding is available, we offer a sliding scale based on a patient’s ability to pay. Your tax-deductible donations to VNA Northwest enable the agency to provide hospice and home care to patients who are uninsured or underinsured.

What is Hospice Care and How Does it Work?

Hospice is a special concept of care designed to provide comfort and support to patients and their families when a life-limiting illness no longer responds to cure-oriented treatments. At VNA Northwest, each hospice case is managed by our team of dedicated professionals, including physicians, nurses, home health aides, therapists, social workers, clergy and trained volunteers. They work together to meet the needs of patients as they near the end of life. And each case is unique. For example, if a patient requests it, we will send a licensed hairstylist who is also a member of the agency’s office staff to cut the patient’s hair. Our team is dedicated to ensuring that patients live their final days with dignity, without pain and in a loving environment. **Please see next page for family testimonials.**
